

Washington, D.C., The White House - Brothers Thabiti Boone and Robert Fairchild represented and participated on behalf of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., at the President's White House Affordable Care Act Open Enrollment Leadership Roundtable. The special White House Meeting was held Monday, September 28, 2015. Select leaders and organizations, along with Congressional Representatives and representatives from the US Department of Health and Human Services, met to discuss strategies and Outreach efforts to support President Obama's Commitment to increase Health Care Insurance enrollment, particularly in the African American Community among Men.

FROM WHERE I SIT: Brothers, My name is Gregory C. Pittman. I serve as a Family Court Judge in the State of Michigan, and have so served since 1998. I was initiated into the Fraternity through Sigma Chapter (Michigan State University) in the spring of 1983. I proudly serve on the International Committee for Fatherhood and Mentoring, representing the Talented Tenth District.

On a weekly basis I am involved in all manner of situations that bring to the fore, the impact and import of the involvement, or lack of involvement, of men in the lives of their children. Literally, the life and/or death of a child hinges on the quality of the participation of the man who created him or her.

consecutive year. Omega men on the Steering Committee were Brothers Richard Layne, Frank Miles, and Jerry Watkins.

In its inaugural year in 2014, parental participation and awards rejuvenated the Mentees and motivated them to perform better for the 3rd and

4th quarters. This year, Mentees participated more in the program.

Students Jashua Morton and Rocklin Curtis provided the opening and closing prayers. After the welcome by Ms. Holland, parent Paula Dofat gave an exhilarating presentation on the parent's responsibilities in raising their sons.

As a College counselor in the Baltimore City School System and having a son Malachi who is a senior in the Howard County School System, Ms. Dofat was able to share her professional and personal experiences with her four sons' ages 14, 16, 18, and 20.

To round out the program, Certificates and McDonald's gift cards were presented to students for academic achievements for the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> quarters. Subjects recognized and awarded were Math, Science, Social Studies, English, and Spanish.

Certificates were also given to students with improvements in learning behaviors, school

attendance, and Omega mentoring attendance sessions. This year we included Chess as part of our Elementary and Middle Schools curriculum.

Bro. Chester Williams recognized the students with the best attitude, knowledge and progression of the game. The program concluded with a light

meal and fellowship between the parents and the Omega Mentors.

This gave parents the opportunity to talk to Mentors about their sons. Parents shared that they can see the development and growth in their sons since entering the program. Mentors shared areas where the student needs improvement. We continue to emphasize the importance of the parent's involvement and reinforce our mentoring efforts.

Speaking specifically of the Manhood 101 portion of the program, Wood stated, "Manhood 101 has been my guardian angel. The men of Manhood 101 have impacted my life in a big way. They taught me that not having my father in my life is not an excuse anymore. Manhood 101 has taught me how to take responsibility for my actions and to earn

respect from my peers and elders. I have grown as a student and as a young man due to presence of the Manhood 101 mentors."

Bro. Bart Griffin, a senior project manager at BG&E, is a mentor and active member of the Lambda Gamma Gamma Chapter. Bro. Griffin brought this opportunity

to the young men of the Manhood 101 Program at Charles Herbert Flowers High School. For the past three years, the Brothers of the Lambda Gamma Gamma Chapter have sought to empower and uplift the young men through its weekly mentoring program.

Psi Lambda Lambda Mentoring Initiative New York, NY. June 2015 – Psi Lambda Lambda Chapter participates in monthly mentoring of elementary age children at the Global Charter School in Harlem. Bro. Taameir Drew, Chapter Editor, is a teacher in the school and oversees the mentoring as well as reading program called "Reading with the Bruhs". Brothers rotate each month to address the students as well as read different books relating to African American History and careers. The program is six months old and to date Brothers have sponsored a children's library through the donation of new books and monetary funding.

## **Omega Academy Charles Bolden Session**

Greater Washington, DC – The Omega Academy (OA) Mentor Coaches led young men through a curriculum that included career-planning exercises. Its purpose was to help youth *transform themselves into self-reliant young men*. The career-oriented workshop involved the aviation industry. An array of career tracks ranging from military and commercial piloting to technicians specializing in aircraft or helicopter repair and maintenance to aeronautical engineering and design were offered.

OA also provided information on outstanding black pilots who made significant contributions to the field of aviation and United States history. Brother Major S. Galloway opened the workshop with introductions and a prayer. The first presentation was on "the Aviation Industry and Flight Instruction."

Flight Instruction: Operating an Airplane (Cessna 150 and 171). Alpha Omega's Bro. Celio Young, a practicing attorney, pilot and flight instructor, introduced participants to the field of aviation and provided flying instruction. Participants engaged in pre-flight check, the parts and functions of an airplane, how a flight plan is developed, how

pilots communicate with air-traffic controllers, and enjoyed a flying experience.

Outstanding Black Aviators in U.S. History: Bro. Nijel Redrick introduced the youth to accomplished professional men they may want to do research on to learn about potential career options. Three famous African-American aviators who were Tuskegee airmen were introduced to the youth: John Robinson, the Father and Founder of the Tuskegee Airman Program, Gen. Benjamin Davis, Jr, and Gen. Daniel Chappie James, the first African-American four-star General who flew missions in Vietnam and commanded NORAD in the 1970's.

The youth also learned about **Bro. Ret. Maj. Gen. Charles F. Bolden,** a former Marine pilot, astronaut and the current NASA Administrator. Looking Ahead OA is designing a Career-Planning/Job Fair Workshop to include: several professionals from an array of fields: medicine, the law and related fields, banking, accounting and financial services and engineering. Participants will be encourage to research famous African-American professionals in career fields they want to learn about.

**Prince William County, VA** – On Friday October 16, 2015, members of the Pi Lambda Lambda Chapter Fatherhood Committee donated 380 composition books to Dumfries Elementary School Principal Marlene Coleman to assist students in the school's writing campaign.

## **Youth Leadership Conference**

Los Angeles, CA, October 10, 2015 – The Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., Tau Tau Chapter, in partnership with the Omega Educational Foundation, Inc., and several Southern California Chapters sponsored its 22<sup>nd</sup> consecutive Youth Leadership Conference (YLC). The Conference was held at the University of Southern California (USC) where more than 1000 folks connected to the YLC were moving about on a very hot and humid day.

In his initial wrap-up report, program founder and executive director of the Omega Educational Foundation, Inc., Ricky L. Lewis, reported that all went well and excitement prevailed on the campus of the University of Southern California. Fatherhood Initiative," said Lewis. In addition to the youth, mothers and fathers, and approximately 150 men of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity were there to work with the youth and their parents.

The morning began for most members of the Fraternity at about 5:30 a.m. on the Trousdale Parkway in front of Taper Hall. Tables, chairs, and canopies were being setup to receive the more than 1000 guess who began arriving as early as 7:00 a.m. Dr. Max Nikias, president of the University was at Seeley G. Mudd Hall at 9:00 a.m. "to speak to the High school young men about The Power of Perseverance," Lewis said.

After his 20 minute talk, president Nikias invited the students to ask him questions and they did. The first question put to the president was: How did you become president of USC? To which he responded, he was first a faculty member, then became dean, provost and finally, some folks thought enough of him to appoint him president. He was asked what subjects does USC offer, and a revealing question was, "How much does it cost to attend USC and what does one have to do to be admitted to the University?"

President Nikias' reply was, \$48,000 per year. He also said to the students, USC ranks number three in the country of major research universities in the number of African American students who attend similar Universities. He told the students that USC wants to attract "well rounded students" not just students with high grades; he said USC had plenty financial assistance if students needed it.
