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

Omega Men: Raising Boys to be Men: On Being a Dad

Brothers, I trust that everyone had a great Father's Day. When you think about it, one day of recognition does not begin to adequately cover the impact that a father has or can have on the lives of their children. Many fathers wonder: how do I have a better relationship with my children? Many see the child and the father as two separate

entities that come together "on occasion". In too many instances they don't come together at all. Even in much of our efforts we work with the two separately, almost as if they have little or anything to do with each other. We work with fathers on father issues and mentoring of young men around their issues. In reality the two go together like a hand and a glove.

When we mentor young men, we are really doing the father's job in his absence. The father's absence can be for many reasons, ranging from "I don't care to"- "I would love to but I can't." A lot of negativity can come from not having a father in a young man's life where he is not taught about his responsibility and how to conduct himself. As we insert ourselves in these situations through our programs, we should work toward making sure that we are working to solve the problem and not pacify it and keep it going.



What do I mean by this? We have to work with the fathers who are already at the fathering stage and with the overwhelming majority of young men who we know will become fathers by providing solutions.

So, what am I suggesting? As we work with fathers, help them with their issues (child support, jobs, legal, finances, etc.) and teach and show them how to be a good father as shown in the Future Dads program. At the same time as we are mentoring the young men covering the basics of how to be a good young man (discipline, education, violence prevention, conflict resolution, etc.) teach and show them how to be a good father as shown in the Future Dads program.

When we first put together the Future Dads program it was aimed at college students. We wanted to take a proactive approach and get in front of the issues that a young man would face and how he should conduct himself when he became a father. We have to now look at working and sharing this information at all levels with fathers and with young men. Many of the young men that we are working with don't have a father. So, it makes sense that we should talk to them about what it takes to be a good father as a part of our working with and training them. Likewise, many of the fathers that we work with don't know how to be a good father. We should share this information with them and help them understand its importance in cultivating a good relationship with their children.

Brothers, I ask that we incorporate the points and information in the **Future Dad's program** in all of our fatherhood and mentoring training programs because most of us are or will soon become a dad. It just makes sense that we learn about what we most likely will be doing in the future - Being a dad!

Rewards, Benefits of 21st Century Fatherhood Movement: Considerations for Developing Legislation

ccording to experts at the National Center for Fathering (NCF), Fatherhood has a profound effect on our families, our children, and our communities. The absence of fathers, according to researchers at the American Psychological Association (APA), in their study, <u>Vulnerable Men and Boys</u>, can cause poverty, emotional problems, drug and alcohol use. It can also lead to poor educational performance, suicidal thoughts, criminal behavior and other emotional problems. Over the past ten years the "father absence" epidemic in America has significantly decreased. This is directly attributed to the work of advocates for responsible fatherhood and mentoring.

In 2016 the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) performed research which compared all fathers with varying backgrounds and ethnicities. It was found that the Black father in America was touted as one of the most caring fathers of all races. This is surprising information for many because the media has portrayed Black fathers and Black men as untrustworthy, thugs, and murderers in many instances. In so doing the image of Black men in our opinion, has been damaged and requires repair, correction and a more truthful and accurate depiction.

If one were to view television today, they would be hard pressed to even see a responsible, respectable, image of a Black man loving his family, providing for them, and keeping them safe. For these reasons and more we must take concerted action to redefine Black fathers in particular, and more specifically, fatherhood in general as we promote legislation that highlights the rewards and benefits that responsible fathers perform daily that appear to be overlooked, left out, or forgotten.

The 21st Century Fatherhood Movement is a national collaborative effort supported by countless fatherhood organizations that offer services, supports and opportunities to fathers, families and the community. Today men are stepping up in larger numbers to be counted as mentors to children, antidomestic violence advocates, working side by side with women to train other men and calling for accountability through

training. There are national efforts such as the 52 "Made Men" who were recently honored at The Embassy of Ghana, in Washington, D.C. Other local efforts such as the "Man the Block program" at Richard Wright Charter School, Washington, D.C. directed by Principal Dr. Marco Clark, offering "safe passage" that makes a statement that men and fathers care, and are present to counter and eliminate the threat of violence and other dangers in urban communities.

There is also the work of the Alliance of Concerned Men who under Tyrone Parker's strategic leadership in the careful development of a "Youth Conflict Resolution Manual" and training aimed at keeping peace on the streets, stopping gang violence and bringing peace to the community. Advancing fatherhood's footprint is also being successfully implemented by the 100 Fathers Inc.'s, Fatherhood Master Trainers at Ballou Sr. High School in partnership with the Take Charge Youth Program. In this program adult men and fathers are teaching, mentoring and engaging younger men with "rites of passage" style power sessions that teach self-respect, self-discipline, integrity, leadership and scholarship.

Recently in Prince Georges County, MD, the 2019 Momentum Conference had over 500 attendees, (mostly fathers, parents and youth from D.C. and Maryland) being guided and taught by fathers and adult men and women about how to be proactive when violence is encountered. Organizations such as the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, the Masons, My Brothers' Keeper, the Fatherhood Forum, Men Aiming Higher, Dare to Be King, the B-108 group of Baltimore, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity and the Men in the Gap Ministry's all participate collaboratively. There is also the Prince Georges County, MD "Men's Challenge" a coordinating fathers' group that makes a difference by offering training, resources and alternatives to fathers, men and boys who are stepping up and changing the paradigm *from violence to victory*. This work is further exemplified by the powerful engagement of Mr. Curtis Valentine, Board of Education Member, Prince Georges County and the founder of the Fatherhood Forum which touches, trains and encourages over 300 fathers who serve in the Prince Georges County Public Schools.

Recommendations:

Fathers and men are stepping up, showing up, and bringing positive changes in the lives of our children and families. The message to our legislators is to pass laws that can complement and support the progress of the 21st century fatherhood movement by:

- Providing funding for *mandatory fatherhood training before releasing from incarceration* with follow-up resources to aid the families of the incarcerated.
- Providing Mandatory *conflict resolution training* in the jails, schools and recreation centers.
- Funding for *Rites of Passage* boyhood to manhood leadership training in all grades.
- Funding for fathers in the school's programs to create balance for young men and young ladies.

Summary:

The Seventh Annual Father's Day Celebration entitled: "To be a father is great but to be called a Dad takes a lifelong commitment", is an opportunity to continue to fight for inclusion of the undeniable blessing that fathers bring into the family, the schools, and the community. We hope to continue to build a national collaborative caucus to lobby for the inclusion of the great benefits that committed engaged fathers bring as men who are available, authentic, and affirming. We are bringing back the fathers and bringing renewed hope to our families, children, and communities.


Brother Dr. Robert Henry Lawrence, Jr. – USAF Astronaut, First African-American selected as an astronaut (USAF photo). Born in Chicago, October 2, 1935, graduated from Englewood High School in the top 10 percent of his class. In 1956 he graduated from Bradley University, in Peoria, with a B.A. in Chemistry.

While in college he enlisted in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) and distinguished himself, receiving the commission of Second Lieutenant in the Air Force Reserve Program. While still in the Air Force, Lawrence earned a Ph.D. in Chemistry from Ohio State University in 1965. In June of 1967 he was selected as an astronaut in the Manned Orbital Laboratory (a precursor to the space station), making him the first African American astronaut selected for space travel.

In December of 1967, Dr. Lawrence, a member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., was killed instantly in the crash of an F-104 Starfighter at Edwards Air Force Base, California, leaving his wife Barbara and son Tracey to morn. In a December 26, 2017 article in the GOOD BLACK NEWS, The Good Things Black People Do, Give and Receive All Over The World, Selena Hill wrote: Although his career was short-lived, Lawrence paved the way for other black astronauts like Dr. Guion Bluford, who became the first African American in space in 1983, and Dr. Mae Jemison, the first African American woman to travel to space in 1992.

I want to spend this column space discussing another challenge that recently presented itself in my courtroom. That being:


The Change of Domicile of Child.

The establishment of the physical custody of a child carries the significance, among many things, of establishing the domicile of the child. In the law **domicile** means *place of legal residence*. Essentially, the parent who has primary physical custody obviously lives in some city. The child, obviously, lives there as well. The legal effect, however, is that that city becomes considered the domicile, or *place of legal residence* of the child.

In the State of Michigan, the law requires that the child must remain in the city where domiciled, or within 100 miles of that city of domicile. There is some form of the same requirement in every state. The child can be domiciled outside of that 100-mile radius only if, (a) the parties agree to the relocation, or (b) the relocating parent is granted permission, by court order, to relocate.

To be clear, the parent wishing to relocate is under no restriction from being able to move wherever he/she wishes. That relocating parent, however, cannot move and take the child with them, except as described above. Many parents make the erroneous argument that the court is violating their inherent right to live where they choose. The reality is that the court retains jurisdiction over the child, and lawfully can restrict the child's comings and goings, but not the parent.

The decision to grant the *Change of Domicile of Child* is governed by a set of factors, created by and written into state law by the state legislature, that the court is required to analyze and **must** render its findings thereto on the record. The court can't just "make it up" or "go with its gut" in reaching a very difficult and consequential decision. If you ever find yourself in this type of litigation, please know that the court's decision must be made and supported by a clear record of the court's analysis and reasoning in reaching whatever decision that the court ultimately reaches. Always keep this standard in mind!



- 1. It directly impacts the mobility of the custodial parent.
- 2. It can change the actual custody order issued by the court. If the court denies the change of domicile and the moving parent decides to move anyway, effectively, the noncustodial parent assumes the role of custodial parent.
- 3. Of course, custody drives who pays child support, and how much that support obligation becomes.
- 4. The amount of parenting time for the parents is affected when the domicile is changed. That parenting time change becomes more significant as the amount of distance involved in the move increases. Simply put, the further that the move is from the original domicile of the child, the harder it becomes to engage in opportunities to maintain regular, consistent parenting time as practiced before the move.

His mother is a retired university professor of social sciences, and his father a retired economist. Alibaruho's parents always encouraged his interest in mathematics and science by exposing him to printed material about rockets and about NASA as well as by exposing him to science fiction media of the time. Alibaruho earned a Bachelor of Science in Avionics in 1994 from the Department of Aeronautics and Astronautics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. In May 2011, he earned a Master of Business Administration from Rice University through Rice's Executive MBA Program, which he attended full-time while concurrently performing his duties as Flight Director. A Father: Love, Grace and Mercy

by that I do not reflect on memories of times we shared. Some memories are good and others not so much. One of the memories I hold deep in my heart is when he showed mercy and unconditional love towards me.

My father was a former Soldier and Vietnam Veteran. He ruled our house with an iron fist. He really took Proverbs 13:24 "Spare the rod, spoil the child" seriously when it came to "educating" me and my siblings. The seven words I hated to hear my mother say when I had done something wrong were: "I am going to tell your Father". I knew that when my father got home, he would discipline me. Usually, spanking for PG purposes, was his preferred form of punishment in these cases. The only time I can remember my father not disciplining me after I did something wrong, was the time I burned down the kitchen in our home.

After graduating high school, my parents allowed me to continue to live at home with one stipulation; I must have a job. I was working the opening shift at McDonald's from 5am to 1pm Monday through Friday. Sometimes instead of eating lunch at work I would come home to eat. I will never forget the day I burned down the kitchen.

One day after working my shift at McDonald's, I decided when I got to our home, I was going to cut some potatoes up into French fries and fry them. I was excited, knowing that later that evening a few friends and I had plans to go to the neighboring town to play basketball against the locals. After cutting the potatoes, making the fries, and putting them in the frying pan full of hot grease I decided to watch the VHS basketball tape "Michael Jordan Come Fly with Me". I watched the tape almost every day I was going play basketball. For some reason that day I decided to lay down to watch the tape. The next thing I can remember is waking up to a stove full of fire. I did what any kid would do in this situation, I tried to put the fire out with water. The fire spread due to the water and grease not mixing. By the time I finally got the fire out, half the kitchen was unusable. The first thing that came across my mind was "my father is going to kill me when he gets home from work".

My father usually got home late in the evenings during this period, so I decided to go play basketball and face the consequences when I got back that night. Sure enough, when I returned home that night my father was standing in the door waiting for me. As I braced myself for the looming punishment, I was expecting from my father for burning down the only kitchen we had and leaving the house to go out of town to play basketball, my father gave me a hug. I will never forget his words. My father said, "I love you; I can always get another kitchen but not another you. I am glad you are ok, but I don't understand you leaving to go play basketball after you burned down the kitchen". My father and I never spoke again about this accident.

I learned so much about my father through this accident. I learned the love he had for me and the grace and mercy he showed towards me. I will always remember the day I burned down the kitchen and how my father treated me afterward. ///

Key Message (objective): To celebrate Dads and to encourage other men to continue to be involved and engaged in their children's activities and healthy development.

By sharing our stories, we show this generation of men what Fatherhood looks like. So, don't you dare underestimate the impact you make in the lives of your children and community. At the end of the day a child wants his/her father. He or she wants to know about you and what you like or dislike. You must be "presence" in your children's lives to help them grow into healthy young adults. No Excuses! DW, II

Dr. Guion S. Bluford, Jr. was the first African-American in Space. He boarded the Space Shuttle "Challenger" in 1983 and performed the first "spacelab mission" on the Orbiter Challenger. Born in Philadelphia, PA in 1942, Bluford was a decorated Air Force pilot in Vietnam before joining NASA in the late 1970s. "I felt an awesome responsibility, and I took the responsibility very seriously, of being a role model and opening another door to black Americans, but the important thing is not that I am black, but that I did a good job as a scientist and an astronaut," he said! Bluford graduated from Overbrook Senior High School, 1960; B.S. degree in Aerospace Engineering Pennsylvania State University, 1964; and, M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in aerospace engineering in 1974 and 1978, from the US Air Force Institute of Technology. In 1987, Bluford received his M.B.A. degree

in management from the University of Houston at Clear Lake.

Deliverance While Drowning

Raleigh, NC – Twenty-four years ago, God blessed me with Mollie Annette Williams. Along with this blessing came some of the biggest challenges and duties I have ever experienced. On June 17, 1995, my whole world was changed for the better, for the rest of my life. Going through life with all the unknowns, I find that most people

sometimes have fear and run like Jonah ran when he was given the command by the Lord, to go to Nineveh to serve and save the people living sin. Like Jonah, men fear the command of parenting, because of the unknown. So, we run in the opposite direction or hide, due to the fear of parenting. I believe the three "Fs" should be consider by all fathers young and old when facing what I faced on June 17, 1995. Those three "Fs" are **Fear, Fault and Faith**. Let me explain: Back in my football playing days my head coach for four years said in his pregame speeches, "**Fear** None and Respect All". I've tried to live my life that way and have had very good success in doing so. However, at the birth of Mollie, for unknown reasons I feared the thought of being a Father just like Jonah feared being a King. However, there was one difference between us, I respected the opportunity of becoming a Father. Now, I feared parenting, but living through what I was conditioned to do through my athletic training, I respected it and 24 years later I still fear parenting because of the unknown and the discomfort that comes with it, but I respect everything that is associated with being a Father.

Unlike Jonah, I was given a command to be the best father to Mollie that I could be and the only way that was going to happen was to believe what Isaiah 42:1 says, I was

the chosen one to be Mollie's Father and the Spirit and strength is upon me not to bring justice to the nation but bring joy and love to Mollie's experiences. When the Lord hurdles the storms in our lives as male parents, we can't run and fall asleep on our children like Jonah did on the people of Nineveh. Last point about fear: if God wanted to wage any storms against us, He will never leave nor forsake us but provide us with His everlasting care and guidance.

Secondly, we must admit our "Faults" just like Jonah did in verse 16. The hardest thing to do as a parent is to admit our faults, when it comes to our children. We oftentimes find others at fault when it was us all the time. God, just like in the story of Jonah, wages storms in our lives to get His message across to us. The storm in my life was when the courts of NC sided with my ex-wife and for three years, I had no direct contact with Mollie. I didn't run from my situation, but I had some very tough and long talks with God asking why was Mollie being punished. Brothers, I thought it was about her and it was, but God had a bigger plan at that time. I didn't see the plan, because we never see the plan. The plan was for me to go through this, so I could help other men deal with this storm, when it came into their lives. Like Jonah, God had to put him in the mist of the storm to obey His commands. God knew if He had told me to start Proud Fathers, Inc., serve on the Fatherhood and Mentoring Committee for the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., serve on various fatherhood committees, He knew I wouldn't follow His commands. However, He knew if He took the one person I lived for (Mollie)... If Mollie was taken from me for a short period, He had my attention. The Lord knew I wouldn't obey His commands and go into the ministry, because I had refused His calling/commands for 14 years prior to this incident. Colossians 3:13 tells us to make allowance for each other's fault and forgive anyone who offends you. By admitting your faults as Jonah did, we should learn something from him and that we all will be delivered while drowning only if we are honest to ourselves and God. He knows our heart and what we are trying to accomplish with every action we take, the good ones and the bad ones.

Thank God for the third "F", **Faith.** Webster defines faith **as** strong belief or trust in something or someone; the belief in the existence of God. Faith sustained me even when I doubted my faith; Faith sustained me when I had my doubts about what was going on in my life and Faith sustained me when I questioned God's plan even though I didn't know the plan. God sometimes has a funny way of getting His points across to us and we feel like we are

drowning and no life preserver is in sight. But, I'm here to tell you that your Deliverance occurs when you are Drowning. All you have to do is have faith and trust the plan God has in store for you. I know that it's easier to speak it, than live it. Hebrews 11:1 tells us, "Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see".

What I didn't see was that God's plan, at the time, it wasn't clear at all. Please know that I'm not blaming my ex; she did what she thought was best for Mollie at that time. Sixteen years later, I was able to enjoy Father's Day and Mollie's birthday, something I thought I would never experience again. This year, we took a train ride to Washington, D.C.



and we talked, went to a National's baseball game, jazz show, dinner and most importantly spent time together just the two of us. We will never regain that lost time but God has prepared the both of us for this moment and we both are going to enjoy every second of it. My faith and finally becoming obedient to God's commands have, of course, paid off. Mollie has grown to become the young lady that I hoped she would be and all my prayers were answered. Even though I couldn't see them, I stood on my Faith. Hebrews 11:3, By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that what is seen was not made out of what was visible. Therefore, I wasn't supposed to see all the prayers answered that I prayed for and over Mollie. However, I'm here to tell you that they all were answered.

Brothers, I felt compelled to share my testimony and I hope that these words help a Brother that is drowning and I wanted him to know that his **Deliverance Occurs while Drowning**. Peace and Blessings Brothers! ///

Dr. Mae Carol Jemison was born October 17, 1956 in Decatur, AL. Seeking educational and economic opportunity, her parents moved the family to Chicago where she completed Elementary and High School. Jemison graduated from Chicago's Morgan Park High School in 1973 and entered Stanford University at the age of 16. She is an American engineer, physician and NASA astronaut. She became the first black woman to travel in space when she served as an astronaut aboard the Space Shuttle *Endeavour*. After graduating with a degree in chemical engineering from Stanford University and a medical degree from Cornell University, she served in the Peace Corps from 1983 until 1985. Jemison joined NASA's astronaut corps in 1987 and orbited the Earth for nearly eight days on September 12–20, 1992, serving as a mission specialist on the STS-47 mission. In 1993, she resigned from NASA and founded a technology research company and later formed a non-profit educational foundation for children. She has appeared

on television several times, including in an episode of *Star Trek: The Next Generation*. Jemison holds nine honorary doctorates in science, engineering, letters, and the humanities. 

Dr. Bernard Harris, Jr., born on June 26, 1956, the son of Mrs. Gussie H. Burgess, and Mr. Bernard A. Harris, Sr. A native of Temple, Texas. He graduated from Sam Houston High School, San Antonio, in 1974; received a Bachelor of Science degree in biology from the University of Houston in 1978 and a doctorate in medicine from Texas Tech University in 1982. Dr. Harris completed a residency in internal medicine at the Mayo Clinic in 1985 and joined the NASA Ames Research Center in 1986. His work focused on the field of musculoskeletal physiology and disuse osteoporosis. He trained as a flight surgeon at the Aerospace School of Medicine, Brooks AFB, San Antonio, Texas, in 1988 and became an astronaut in July 1991. He was assigned as a mission specialist on STS-55, Spacelab D-2, in August 1991, and later flew on board *Columbia* for ten days. Dr. Harris was the Payload Commander on STS-63 (February 2-11, 1995), the first flight of a new joint Russian-American space program. Mission highlights included the rendezvous with the Russian Space Station, *Mir*, operation of a variety of investigations in the Spacelab module, and the deployment and retrieval of *Spartan 204*, an orbiting instrument that studied galactic dust clouds (such as those

where stars are born). During the flight, Dr. Harris became the first African-American to walk in space. Among his many professional, social service and civic organizational affiliations is the **Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity**, Inc.

were present. Noncustodial fathers were in attendance and continually asked questions about their particular circumstances. Hundreds attended and asked questions via the Facebook live feed (GA DHS Facebook page). The program is the brainchild of current GA State Representative Brother Marvin Broadwater, Sr. The program has grown since its infancy and inception from six to ten events a year across the State of GA. The program allows the

opportunity for the State to fund other similar fatherhood events for smaller Chapters.

Although, the Georgia Division of Child Support Services (DCSS) seeks to educate all parents of the Fatherhood Program, most noncustodial parents do not initially need nor qualify for services when they are first contacted by DCSS. In situations where a noncustodial parent is faced with an unexpected loss of a job or they have a substantial decrease in their income, that is the time when they need help.

The Fatherhood Program is administered by Georgia DCSS to help noncustodial parents avoid having to appear before a judge in court. It is an employment-based service that focuses on providing services that can help the noncustodial parent achieve



self-sufficiency. It also encourages parents to increase emotional, parental and financial involvement in the lives of the noncustodial parent's children. Services offered include: Driver's License Reinstatement; Child support Services; GED Enrollment; Job Training; Job Search and Placement; Volunteer Work Opportunities; and Support order modification, where applicable.

Each month of the school term a student was selected from each school to participate in the program. The selection process involved soliciting the help of school counselors, and administrators. The criteria for the selection of the students focused on: students demonstrating leadership, volunteer service, and academic improvement. Students who were selected by school faculty received a YMA certificate, and a \$50 stipend from Walmart. At the end of the school year the selected students will attend YMA leadership training in the summer. The trainings will involve tutorials in: learning skills, appearance and communication, mental health awareness, future educational goals, cooking with a grill, and physical health. The students will continue to be followed by the chapter and will possibly be recruited to mentor the next set of students selected for the 19 – 20 school years.

Brother, You're On My Mind Omicron Beta Chapter



Mount Pleasant, MI — Omicron Beta Chapter organized its first annual programming initiative addressing mental health awareness; Brother, You're On My Mind on November 16, 2018. This mental health initiative originally instituted by Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., in partnership with the National Institute on Minority Health and Disparities (NIMHD) is a national program that attacks the stigma on mental health and depression. This is implemented to change the national dialogue regarding the issue among African American men.

The mission of this program initiative is to educate not only members of Omega, but family members, peers, and other community members that deal with the challenges of mental health. A goal that was emphasized during this program was to communicate the importance of seeking help when

coping with mental health issues and to encourage affected individuals to get information from their health care providers and others in order to obtain appropriate treatment. Every year, more than 40 million Americans struggle with mental illness. African American men are as likely as anyone else to have mental illness, but they are less likely to get help. Depression and other mental illness can be deadly if left untreated. Suicide is the third leading cause of death among African Americans 15 to 24 years old. Untreated mental illness can also make African

American men more vulnerable to substance abuse, homelessness, incarceration, and homicide.

Brothers Emmanuel Glass (Basileus), Miles Newton (Vice Basileus), Floyd Beard (KRS), and Christopher Sanders contributed in the coordinating and event planning for this event. This event consisted of a presentation that gave attendees a brief snapshot of the statistical breakdown, showing evidence that the problem of depression and suicide is in the African American community.



The program included several performances about how to combat the stigma that surrounds mental health; these performances included activities such as: singing, spoken word and sharing personal experiences. The overall purpose for these specific accounts was to inform students on campus and other faculty members about how prevalent the issues actually are, show that there could be someone who may be a classmate or a close friend that one may see almost every day suffering from these issues.

According to the event presentations, some barriers that usually prevent African American men from getting treated for mental illness include: lack of access to care, lack of insurance, poor cultural understanding by therapists and the stigma around sharing feelings and emotions. The audience was also given an opportunity to share their

own perspectives and feelings on the subject matter and also express the importance of communication surrounding the subject itself.

Bro. Glass described the event as something that was innovative for CMU's campus; it was something new that had never been done before and he was shocked that this topic had yet to have been addressed formally. Bro. Newton was elated about the event's manifestation and the turnout overall, stating that "this event is something the chapter will continue to do for years to come. We want to ensure that there is an outlet for students to express their feelings and experiences." The brothers of the chapter are extremely humbled to be recognized by the fraternity and are also very appreciative for the chance to share their wonderful experience with the rest of the brothers of the organization.

Stephanie Diana Wilson was born September 27, 1966 in Boston, MA; she is an American engineer and a NASA astronaut. She flew to space onboard three Space Shuttle missions, and is the second African American woman to go into space, after Mae Jemison. Her 42 days, 23 hours and 46 minutes in space are the most of any African American astronaut, male or female. She attended Stearns Elementary School a public school and Crosby Junior High School. For a career awareness class in middle school, Wilson was assigned to interview someone in a field that interested her. Since she liked to look up at the sky, she interviewed Williams College astronomer Jay Pasachoff, clarifying her potential career interest in space. In high school, her dad encouraged Stephanie to go into engineering; she decided to become an aerospace engineer. After graduating from Taconic High School, Pittsfield, Massachusetts, in 1984 Stephanie attended Harvard University, receiving a bachelor of science degree in engineering science in 1988 and earned a Master of Science degree in aerospace

engineering from the University of Texas, in 1992.

Brother Dr. James King, Jr. April 23, 1933 – January 27, 2017

Zeta Tau Chapter Brother Dr. James King, Jr., was a native of Columbus, GA, a Morehouse graduate, and former resident of Pasadena, CA. Dr. King was the first African American PhD hired at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL). After completing his PhD at Caltech in 1958, Dr. King began working as a research engineer of electrochemistry with Atomics International – a division of North American Aviation, Inc. During this time, he developed a method to measure the temperature inside atomic reactors. In the 1960s, during a Middle Eastern oil crisis, Dr. King began to engineer solar-powered cars. He joined JPL in 1961 to study the reactions between ions and molecules. In 1969, after working on a project investigating the physical chemistry of hydrogen and devising a new theory for gas anesthesia and how it works, Dr. King became manager of the physics section of JPL and later became Director of Engineering and Science, the largest directorate at JPL.

- A schoolgirl and an adult man were killed and 15 other young girls injured in a stabbing at a bus stop just outside Tokyo, Japan on May 28, 2019.
- On May 7, 2019 two teenagers walked into a STEM School, Highlands Ranch in suburban Denver, Colorado and opened fire with handguns in two classrooms killing one student and injuring eight others.



He has served as a pilot and commander aboard space shuttles *Columbia, Discovery,* and *Atlantis.* He graduated from C. A. Johnson High School in Columbia, South Carolina, in 1964 and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Science from the United States Naval Academy in 1968 and later earned a Master of Science degree in Systems Management from the University of Southern California in 1977. He was a member of the Astronaut Corp from 1980 to 1984 when he returned to assignments in the Marine Corp. His highest rank achieved was Major General and his last assignment was as Commanding General of the 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing. On May 23, 2009, President Barack Obama announced the nomination of Bolden as NASA administrator. Bolden was confirmed by the Senate on July 15, 2009. He was the first African American to head the agency

on a permanent basis. He is a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. Bolden lives in Houston, and is married to Alexis (née Walker); the couple have two children.



One highlight featured the girls coming back from being down by 15 points in the 4th quarter against the Czech Republic to force overtime but losing on a sudden death free throw. The U19 girls came in 4th out of 12 teams and U16 team came in 6th out of 16 teams.

Since January, the Brothers of Phi Gamma Gamma located in Kaiserslautern, Germany have raised over \$3000 in cash to support the U-16 and U-19 Girls' Basketball Teams.
