

## Just A Thought: What is THE African American Experience?

hen discussing the so-called African American Experience over the past 404 years, it cannot be disputed that through our ancestor's blood and sacrifice our people have overcome nearly insurmountable odds.

After being kidnapped and brought to the New World against their will, forced into enslavement and subjected to hideous atrocities, they still built one of the greatest nations in the world with their bare hands and created a culture that produced not only some of the greatest leaders, but introduced styles that have captivated, impacted and influenced others throughout the global environment in which we exist.

CULTURE, ONE OF THE MAIN components that defines a people, and the so-called American Black Experience as we know it today, emerged from an African culture that our ancestors were not allowed to carry from their homeland.

To paraphrase Pastor **Joshua Cullins** in the documentary **Reclaiming the Throne**, he describes the American Black Experience by saying: It is a shared condition and sum of experiences we suffered at the hands of our oppressors and colonial masters.

OUR ANCESTORS WERE FORCED TO IMPROVISE, adapt, and overcome systematic and vicious attempts to disconnect them from their rich and powerful African heritage. The fact that they were denied the opportunity to read and write resulted in a new or hybrid African American culture being created primarily with oral

hen discussing the so-called history elements derived from their African American Experience true African culture.

With just a minimum amount of research, the deliberate omissions and erasure of the magnificent, wealthy, and dominant African contributions by those that call themselves historians is revealed. That practice of historical misrepresentation and deletion has been, and continues to be key variables in the formula to keep Black people in the dark about who they really are.

From scholars like **Hugh Trevor Roper** who spread fallacies that
Africa had no discernable history until
Europeans arrived and archeologists
like **Giuseppe Ferlini** and French
explorers who destroyed historical
African artifacts, documents, books
and tombs, to today where current
elected public servants are leading
campaigns to minimize and rewrite
the value and importance of Black
history.

In 2023, we find that overt racism has reared its ugly head once again and attempts to erase our past, disconnect us from our heritage and return us to a submissive condition is a reality. However, this time, our children have been the targets.

IT APPEARS, SCHOOL BOARDS are being compromised, teachers are being intimidated and removed, books are being banned, history is being rewritten and most egregiously, over the past decades our music has been a continuous, persistent, and sustained source of indoctrination of our youth.

Songs that top the charts now are no longer about being Black and Proud or Black is Beautiful instead it's about glorifying, predicting and

accepting our own demise. No longer are our brothers and sisters looked on as being **Young Gifted and Black** instead it's (n-words) and (b-words). To paraphrase Pastor Cullins again, he states that we (African Americans) are the only ones who celebrate our own demise and degradation.

We are still being lynched. Today it's just police and vigilantes killing us. We are still on the plantation; today it's just the privatized prisons. We still live under Jim Crow Laws; today it's just restrictive state voting legislation.

WHEN I HEAR THE TERM WOKE coming out of the mouths of those that can't even define it, I wonder if they realize what it actually means. Woke is a form of the word awake which means to emerge from sleep. Become alert, to be attentive, to come to life.

Whereas the opposite of woke is the word sleep which is a form of the word asleep: I assume this is what the anti-woke people consider themselves: Not attentive or alert, inactive, having no feeling, as in his legs were asleep. I'd rather stay woke. Share our true history.

## Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI): A Reason to Care, Mitigate, Market ...

## Diversity as a Business Strategy: How Diversity Leads to Organizational Success

ORPORATE LEADERS **ARE** tasked with creating shareholder value. This is a singular mission. To perform this guiding mandate, executives should pursue actions that benefit their stakeholders.

Organizations can fulfill their aim by insisting that their talent resources are equipped to face various business scenarios. This takes a staff, board, and management team that possesses myriad skills and experience. This article examines a business case for diversity. Three areas where a focus on diversity can be good for the bottomline are observed. Before doing so, let's see if we can come to an agreement on the meaning of diversity.

Diversity is simply the multiplicity of traits, skills, backgrounds your talent pool may possess. By talent, I mean your board, volunteers, and staff. Diversity includes a wide variety of categories. Here are some descriptors:

Race – Gender – Identity – Sex Orientation National Origin – Age – Marital Status – Religion – Disability – Ability – Personality Income – Geography – Education -**Parental Status** – Class – Generation

As you may see, diversity can mean different things to different people. The utility of identifying these distinctions is not to highlight what separates us. The important takeaway is the realization that our members, staff and stakeholders may see the organization in different ways. Armed with this understanding, we can see how wellintended decisions can be mistaken by audiences with different perspectives.

barrier to overcome, we should consider viewing diversity as a tool for Most businesses are unremarkably indistinguishable from their competitors. The differences that separate some companies from others is often lost on the public. It befits institutions to seek advantages that highlight a superior business model.

Back to the business case. Here are three areas where organizations can improve their bottom-line incorporating diversity in their organizations.

**DIVERSITY AS DUTY OF CARE: Every** corporate official has legal fiduciary duties which must be obeyed. One of the responsibilities is called the Duty of Care. The Duty of Care is a legal requirement imposed on directors and officials corporate requiring compliance to a standard of reasonable care while performing their roles for the organization.

The Duty of Care implies a reasonable officer seeks to advance corporate opportunities. Therefore, it seems reasonable that an effort to expand diversity would be expected if the anticipated results are better returns.

On the opposite side of the equation, corporate officials are warned to avoid wasting company's resources. The Corporate Waste Doctrine states directors have a duty to not squander corporate opportunities. It may be reasonable to conclude that the omission of qualified talent with diverse skills handicaps

Rather than focus on diversity as a organization's potential. This is a wasted opportunity.

Another way to think about the competitive advantage. Let's face it. Duty of Care is to consider how corporate resources are invested. The warning to avoid blind-sided risks has application for diversity. The same may be said for human resources. Diverse people talents often lead to greater returns.

> DIVERSITY AS RISK MITIGATION: Every management team should be focused on quality control issues. Quality control requires constant attention to process improvements and strategy performance. One way to improve in these areas is by reducing errors. The first step here is identifying real issues. Lawyers often call this issue spotting.

Most organizations make mistakes. Miscalculations result in bad execution, the formation of the wrong strategy or misjudgment on the cost of a venture. Smart organizations study past failures to understand what went wrong and how to avoid repeating errors. In many instances, bad results came from a failure to incorporate diverse perspectives.

When presented with a problem, management must discern which details are fact and which are noise. The purpose of issue spotting is to ensure management addresses the important matters and avoid missteps.

Diversity improves odds of spotting issues by broadening the perspectives around the table. A team of people who see a situation with different angles improves the probability of recognizing obstacles and developing ways to

alleviate the challenges. Furthermore, the team is more equipped to uncover new opportunities.

DIVERSITY AS MARKETING TOOL: The power of affiliation is natural to many organizations that concentrate their services in a particular target market. Common interests among the customers and members ensure an institution focuses its attention on the needs of its stakeholders.

People often prefer to conduct business with organizations that represent their interests. Identity is a common interest. Organizations that reflect the character and content of its community demonstrate a sensitivity that is not lost on its members. Corporate leaders should ask what image they want to project in their intended market. This is the lens through which members and the community will judge the organization's focus on representation. The adequacy of diversity is not determined by insiders. The audience should be asked for their impressions to get a sense of how members feel diversity has been attained.

A diverse board and staff improve the chances that the organization will be in tuned with its customers. The results may be services and products that truly addresses the needs of the audience.

In summary, corporate leaders have a duty to improve the way they serve

members. Diversity offers organizations benefits in so many ways. A strategy built on diversity employs all stakeholders' interests as a competitive advantage. Seems like a no-brainer.

## A Tale of Two Morals–Character is Destiny! Implications for Fathers


This is a tale of two morals; one, a spoiled rich child who apparently never learned to tell the truth or the importance of doing the right thing. In 1973, he and his father were accused by the Department of Justice of violating the civil rights of Black people that were trying to rent an apartment in the buildings owned by this father and son duo. This son later became the President of The United States.

The other child grew up in Shriver's Row in Harlem. He was taught high morals, solid values, and the importance of telling the truth by his parents. He strived for excellence in the classroom and graduated from Harvard Law School. This son later became the Manhattan District Attorney.

On Thursday, March 30, 2023, HISTORY WAS MADE when this Manhattan DA became the first prosecutor in the United States of America to charge a former president with a crime. Ironically, one was born in the same year that the other was accused of racist practices and had to pay a hefty fine for discriminating against people of color who were attempting to rent apartments in his property.

I teach leadership development. I train on the virtues of qualities like confidence, integrity, accountability, and compassion that allow leaders to reach their maximum potential. These are the tenants of leadership that help those in leading roles to succeed. Regrettably, over the

past few years these vital principles have seemingly been under attack. There has been an all-out assault on morals, ethics, and the leadership values that I teach to those that want to excel in leadership. Principles like, honesty, uprightness and basic decency have really taken a hit. We see people

in leadership positions, at the highest levels, that do not tell the truth and that demonstrate unethical standards in their actions daily. Social media has inundated the airways with twisted and convoluted philosophies that are the very antithesis of what I have been teaching to the leadership ranks.

As fathers, we are the Leaders for our Children. It is up to us to espouse the principles of virtue and fortitude to our children so that they will grow up to be leaders. It is up to us to be the example, showing the way forward and to live in values that build stellar character.

"Leadership is not about being in charge. It's about taking care of those in your charge," Simon Sinek.

I encourage all fathers to "stay the course." Lead by example, and show your children the right path, at whatever age, by modeling the behavior yourself. Encourage them to think critically about the world around them and to form their own opinions. Don't let today's bombardment of lack of ethics, morals and values cloud your influence as a father on your children. ### **History Bears Witness to the Truth**

"Remember the days of old, Consider the years of all generations. Ask your father and he will inform you, your elders, and they will tell you." Deuteronomy 32:7 Brother Charles "Chuck" Clemons, M.Div., 12th District Chaplain

In 1969, a little Methodist Church was set ablaze by an white community who are fearful unknown arsonist in New Jersey. A year after the assassination of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., my Father, the late Rev. Charles Lee Clemons, Sr., and the congregation of Reeveytown African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church awoke to their church set ablaze. Detectives who investigated the charred site found evidence of a kerosene canister and candles strewn through the sanctuary, yet no culprit could be found. The muchcoveted land was owned by this African American congregation and had descended from brothers who were of African and Indigenous-American ancestry. Stories were recalled that local business owners, land developers, and city officials were trying to coerce the church to sell the property.

My Father, the Men, and the Women of this church pooled their resources and set their minds to rebuild. With the little they had, they raised funds to start anew. Their actions inspired others to donate time and money. The Society of Friends (often referred to as the Quakers) after hearing of the church's plight volunteered man hours on the construction site. My mother, Cherrie Sheppard-**Clemons**, recalled receiving a visitor to our home who sat in the living room with my father. He was a wealthy neighbor who had planned to build a swimming pool that year (1969) for \$5,000. He was so disgusted that anyone would burn a church or possibly attack the Black community, he signed the check over to my Father for the church. These actions together shape a community and family history of resilience and triumph.

MY HISTORY IS A SMALL SUBSET of the rich legacy and heritage of our people who descended from Africa. Our stories collectively bear witness to the truth of our God-given value and dignity. Like any story there are aspects that we may mourn, some we celebrate, and some we question to unearth lessons for us to use to navigate the challenges of today.

In America, we are experiencing demographic and cultural change. This shift in the predominance of ethnic groups has elicited a reaction from many in the larger

of a multi-ethnic or multi-cultural society. Compounding those fears is an unresolved guilt related to the founding and development of the Americas based on a racial caste

system. What we commonly call, systemic racism.

THE SCRIPTURES (DEUTERONOMY 32:7), invited the ancient Jew then and the modern man today, to remember the works of God in earlier times. Remembering how God rescued in the past from trouble encouraged faith for today. The Israelites who had been rescued from Egypt and brought into the promised land were also warned not to forget God in the good times in the "land flowing with milk and honey." History reminds us of the truth of who we are and where we come from!

FOR AMERICA TO BE GREAT, it must not run from its history, but remember, teach, and learn from it. Within the American experience, there are histories we must learn and renounce its evil: the decimation of the Indigenous peoples, the Enslavement of Africans, Jim Crow, Segregation, Redlining, and Police Brutality. Then there is within history acts we should remember to celebrate: the great Kingdoms of Africa - wealth and ingenuity, the inventors of Africa and America (Ancient and Modern); our legacy of decorated warriors from African Chiefs, Black Conquistadors, Black Patriots, and Decorated Military Men and Women.

There exist countless other stories of African histories within the larger world history of mankind. This brief recalling of Black history could not be scaled to fit within this article, but I end with remembering a Christ-like leader, Black Man within my house, the Rev. Charles L. Clemons, Sr., who made his mark on history through the uplift of our people. FIETTS



## **Mentoring the Next Generation of Engineers**

**BROTHER TROIANO "TORI" FRANKLIN** is an Associate Director of R&D for the endo mechanical platform at Ethicon, Inc.

Brother Franklin was recently invited to speak at the University of Cincinnati's National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) chapter 2023 Corporate Week. During this week in February, they feature different company representatives to come and speak about their workplace experiences and provide insights or advice on navigating the corporate world as a Black Professional.

Tori spoke to their General Body about the P.I.E. Model that was topic and subject of the book "Empowering Yourself, The Organizational Game Revealed," by Harvey J. Coleman.

In the book, Coleman explored the impact of PIE on your career success. Looking at 3 key elements that contribute to progression in your career:

- 1. Performance
- 2. Image
- 3. Exposure

Coleman says that **performance is 10%** of career progression, **image is 30%**, and **exposure is 60%** one's career progression. He emphasizes that "**Right-sizing the balance**" between these three dimensions is critical for career positioning and progressing.

Tori told the group that each model "needs to be right sized for you" and he explained what it looks like going "from good to great," as shown in the P.I.E Differentiation chart above. Brother Franklin shared his personal experiences with students that were lessons learned from 20 years of engineering experience. ///

#### The Love of a Father


"He who spares the rod hates his son, but he who loves him is careful to discipline him." Proverbs 13:24

Raleigh, NC – October 3, 1975 would change my life forever; that was the day my parents separated. I was 12 years old living what I thought was the best life a child could live. I had both my parents, a little brother, and my grandparents, both sets were just a stone's throw from our home in Rocky Mount, NC. On that day, my mother decided to leave my father. Neither I nor my brother knew what was going on. I became an angry 12-year-old boy in the blink of an eye. When the dust settled, I remained in Rocky Mount and was raised by a single father and my brother went to Virginia and was raised by a single mother. This decision was made by father.

June 8, 1988 was another day in my life I will never forget. I was twenty-five years old, and my father and I finally had "the talk" — that discussion about what happened on October 3, 1975. My father, Melvin, Sr., met me at Burger King on Glenwood Avenue in Raleigh NC. We ate lunch and talked about what had been troubling this 12-year-old boy all these years. The talk helped but it was not until June 17, 1995, when my daughter Mollie was born that our relationship changed. It did not fully return to its pre-October 3, 1975 state;

but I knew I wanted to be the father to Mollie that I thought he wasn't to me.

My father is a man with third-grade education in the 70's that took on the sole responsibility to raise his angry 12 years old son. For me, that speaks volumes to who Melvin Lee Williams, **Sr.,** is. He told me that he was not going to allow me to disrupt my mother's life any worse than he had already done. He felt that he needed to take anything that was going to make my mother's life any worse than it was when family our split





because of something he did. From 12 years old to 60 years old, my father has never missed event. He watched me and showed me how to deal with my anger and demonstrated to me through his actions how to be the best man I could be - even when things are not going

well.

When Daddy attended all my sports awards programs and games, I always considered his presence special; but his attendance at my graduation from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary tops them all. To me, it was that day that our relationship went full circle together under a watchful eye of our Lord and Savior. It became clear to me that the verse listed above is what he lived by. He never let me go unchecked for any negative actions and still today he checks me when I step out of line. The greatest thing I learned from this man is that the best relationship you can have is with our Lord and Savior. Growing up my father didn't attend church, but he made sure I did. Today, he is a deacon in his church, and proves there is great pleasure in serving the Lord.

I turned 60 years old on February 11, 2023. I had a chance to share a meal with my 80-year father. It was an opportune time to talk, really talk and share. During that conversation I thought "What if this man didn't take on the responsibility and recognize I was in no shape to go to Virginia with my mother?" Had he let me go to Virginia, I don't know where I would be right now. Despite our relationships – ups and downs, I thank God every day for giving me the father I have and for giving him the tools and resources he needed to raise me to be the man I am today.

Three things I learned from my father that I keep in my heart:

- 1. Do not be afraid to admit when you are wrong,
- 2. Be man enough to own your mistakes and your mess, and most importantly.
- 3. You can always go to our Lord and Savior for help.

I love my father. That 12-year-old boy is not angry anymore and he knows that he is truly blessed and dearly loved by his father. ///

## How My Father, Mr. Leroy Anderson, Sr., Influenced My life

My father, Mr. Leroy Anderson, Sr., had a very positive influence on my life in every facet. He was born the oldest son and one of eleven children to the late Roy and Ethel Anderson in Washington, Georgia. They were of very humble means, but full of faith in God. Dad was also the grandson of a slave, Wash Anderson, who was brought to the United States from Nigeria as a small child. Dad's father was a freed man who gained favor from God and a white land owner to sell him 55 acres

My father realized that he needed to relocate his family to North Carolina to have a better chance for a successful future. At his time of migration there were my parents and my five oldest siblings. Dad had a sister and a brother-in-law who had already moved to Charlotte and proved that there were possibilities for success.

Dad was the oldest one with little formal education but he had plenty common sense coupled with determination. He had an unwavering faith in God, believing that the Lord would make a way even during a "Jim Crow" environment. Within a short period of time my father had two jobs to pay for daily living expenses and save for the future. My father was the primary income earner for the entire family. He demonstrated the importance of having a diligent work ethic for us to follow. Dad and Mom, both taught us to work hard and give our best in school and in all of areas life.

Fast forward... from 1943 to 1962 my parents have gone from getting married in rural Wilkes County, GA to having nine children and now owning their home in Charlotte, NC. Raising all nine children was a team effort for my parents and my siblings. My father always taught his children to give their best in order to have a better opportunity for advancement. To that end, all nine of their children finished high school and college, some of us with advanced degrees.

Our father demonstrated manhood, scholarship, perseverance, and uplift. Dad took his leadership responsibilities seriously. He always made sure that we had everything that we needed in school and in life in general. We would hear our father and mother praying on their knees every night and morning, praying aloud for us all to hear. They would pray for us all by name, along with their siblings, family members, our neighbors, and the members of our church.

Dad had several illnesses, always persevered while battling his illnesses. He was also a double leg amputee but maintained a valid driver's license, mowed his own

lawn, climbed ladders, and performed numerous household chores. He would not allow anything to turn him around once he made up his mind. He frequently shared with us that "nothing can be failure but a try." He would always encourage us to keep on trying until we reached our desired goals.

Dad was a singer! He loved singing metered hymns. He served as the president for the hymn choir for several decades. Sadly, he passed away in 2001 and was not able to see my sons evolve into great singers just as he was. The timeless truths and principles my father taught his children have been passed on to our children and their children.

Dad influenced me to be a father that has an active role in my sons' lives and every dimension of their personhood. My father influenced me to be there for my sons and in all of life's events. Dad also influenced me to be transparent with my sons and let them know that I am not perfect, but with faith in God and His Word, the impossible can be possible if you only believe. Lastly, Dad influenced me to always keep the communication lines open and insure there are no miscommunications. It's doesn't matter where you have come from, but it matters most where you are going. Plan and execute your plan. ///

**Birmingham, AL** February 11: In celebration of Black History Month, and to educate their mentees on black history, the brothers of Psi Kappa Kappa sponsored a trip the Birmingham Institute of Civil Rights, and the 16th Street Baptist Church.

The Civil Rights Institute is a large interpretive museum and research center. It details the events and actions of the Birmingham campaign of 1963, its Children's Crusade, and the other Civil Rights Movement in the 1950s and 1960s. It tells a great story of the movement.

They wrapped up the day after touring the 16th Street Baptist Church. This was the church that served as the primary headquarters for organizers in Birmingham during the civil rights movement of the 1960s. Minister Fred Shuttlesworth was the primary local organizer. While Martin Luther King Jr. and James Bevel were active representing the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC). They led the Children's Crusade, which taught the students nonviolence in protesting.

This is also the church were one of the most extreme acts of violence took place against African Americans. White supremacists boomed the church on September 15, 1963, killings four little innocent girls. Many credit this as the key event that highlighted racism and conditions that blacks were enduring in the south. It gave energy to the movement. (**Tony F. 
Many times we talk about the traditional family and the role of the father/dad but we don't always discuss the single dad; the dad who remarries and raises

- 8. When blending a family how do you keep your biological children from being jealous of your bonus children?





Activities include weekly study halls and grade checks, bimonthly meetings, quarterly events, yearly summits, leadership seminars and academic supervision (grades, scholarship, and college applications, S.A.T., A.C.T and Proficiency exam preparation) to keep them on the path to success.
