Washington, D.C. - Monday, June 5, 2023, Brother Ricky L. Lewis, 42nd Grand Basileus of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., and the Divine 9, met on Capitol Hill with the Honorable Kamala Harris, Vice President of the United States, and her advisory staff. The meeting was described as fruitful and engaging.

The Council of Presidents (COP) had the opportunity to engage with the Vice President on several issues as they relate to African American Families and Communities. Among the prevailing issues discussed were: Florida, Affirmative Action, "Woke," CRT, and Economic Policy of the Biden Administration for African Americans.

According to a report to the Supreme Council of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., after brief remarks, the Vice President invited questions: GB-42 Lewis asked the Vice President about organizations getting "push-back" about going to Florida. Vice President Harris was quoted as saying, "Don't abandon Florida, go and fight! Our Black community need us to show up and advocate. Our community should not feel we left them alone! Empower Gamma Rho (So)-1922; Iota Phi Theta (Fr)-1963. them! Show them we are not going to be defeated."

VP Harris encouraged the D9 to continue speaking out against racism and other issues affecting our communities and our organizations. Accompanying Bro. GB-42 to the in-person meeting with the Vice President were: undergraduate Bro. Ryan Thomas, 2nd Vice Grand Basileus; and Bro. Derrick Ivory, International Social Action Chairman.

During the meeting, the D-9 leadership advocated for: Funding for D-9 organizations to continue their community service work; Mental Health from Alpha Phi Alpha; Voter Registration and Mobilization from Sigma Gamma Rho; Affirmative Action from Delta Sigma Theta: SBA economic issues from Zeta Phi Beta.

Advocacy: Conduct meetings with community leaders: conduct funding petition drives, hold political roundtables with elected officials on legislative issues, meet with fatherhood leaders,

on Political Action Davs: chapter visits to City, State, Federal agencies to meet on behalf of our initiative efforts.

Partner with others: Chapters can and do work in partnership with others:



community organizations, city and state agencies, institutions, social service groups including: schools, churches, sports teams, social and civic clubs, and others.

Celebration: Host and/or create partnership efforts to celebrate, honor, recognize, and salute fathers, i.e., a fatherhood breakfast, lunch, or dinner program honoring Fathers for community service, school involvement. Host a salute to Omega Dads in the Fraternity. Give out Fatherhood Certificates.

One final charge: we place as a high priority for **Father's** the importance of voting – this may be the greatest gift a father can give to his children.

So, let's get out the vote (GOTV)!

STORY TIME – From a 2020s Bruhz: It's all about Mentoring

BOY FROM LOUISVILLE. He is one of the most distinguished among his age group. He is brilliant, handsome, charming, kind, nurturing, empathetic, creative, and, an amazing orator. He has a 3.9 GPA, is a varsity athlete, and is in his school's marching band. He has been writing and delivering speeches since he was 11 years old.

He has been to conferences with the country's highest achieving students amongst his age group and has been identified as a standout individual. Everything in this young man's life points to success! All these things point to guaranteed success, right? He MUST be on the proper trajectory... surely, he stays out of trouble! There is no way he cannot succeed!

NOT TRUE. This young man is from the West End of Louisville - an underresourced community that experiences the myriad of issues that come with crowding and poverty.

He fears that for all the potential and talent he possesses, he may not be able to do anything with these assets. He doesn't know who to turn to about his experiences and obstacles. His mother and father separated when he was still young, so he now lives in an emotionally turbulent single parent home. He doesn't feel loved at home; he is often alienated and treated differently, so he isolates and minimizes himself to fit in and disappear.

In the young man's eyes, his life could go in many directions - he could succumb to his environment and become content with a life expected of a young black man from his neighborhood. Or he could take advantage of the many opportunities and gifts that he has and achieve greatness.

AS THE YOUNG MAN IS WRITING HIS STORY, what narrative will be written in the remaining chapters of his life? Which reality will come into fruition? Most importantly - what will decide the difference in his direction?

HERE IS A 14-YEAR-OLD BLACK NOW, SOME INFORMATION ABOUT with the abusive nature MYSELF. I am a graduate of the University of Louisville with a Bachelor of Science in Economics and a Minor in Pan-African Studies. I work at a local arts agency. I am a wrestling coach, musician, poet, and public speaker. importantly.

> I am a mentor and have worked with many mentoring organizations in West Louisville. My job as a mentor and youth advocate is to ensure that these young people are not only given tools and resources, but also consistent access to people from whom they feel safe enough to learn.

> I AM 24 YEARS OLD, CONSIDERING MY AGE, I often get questions about whether I have enough ability, aptitude, and experience to effectively mentor young people. I used to question these things myself, but after spending over 8 years pouring into those coming behind me who navigate the same terrain that I once traversed, I see my age as a superpower in my mentoring.

> My age and proximity to youth are more helpful than hindering. They have kept me humble, made me a better listener, and taught me many lessons about what it means to be an effective mentor and why many of the most effective are closer in age to the people in whom they invest.

> THE FIRST THING THAT I LEARNED: mentorship must be more horizontally integrated than vertically. In economics, there is a set of terms called vertical and horizontal integration. Vertical integration shows a level of depth or expertise, while horizontal integration is more about the wide breadth of relationships.

> It is less about an area of expertise and more about an ability to provide a safe space regardless of what form the relationship takes. An effective mentorship must be one that is a safe space to experience the pains that come with growth; a gentle space to engage

of life's many hardships.

SECOND, mentors must not only be relatable, but nurturing and understanding. In



any effective mentorship, the mentee should determine the nature, pace, and direction of the relationship.

Many young black males, including myself, often feel ostracized by those who are older because the lessons become more about what to do, which often leaves the individual out of the equation. When mentors are younger, the relationship is more likely to have a foundation of listening and tailoring mentoring to the needs/desires of the youth.

LAST, AND MOST IMPORTANT; younger mentors are much more likely to be transparent about obstacles shortcomings than older mentors. A mentor's mistakes and missteps are often the building blocks of how the mentee can grow, develop, and comprehensively be better. To get a mentee to buy in and give trust, the mentor must earn it with transparency, which younger mentors are more equipped to provide.

NOW, BACK TO THE BEGINNING OF THE STORY. That 14-year-old young man's name is Elliott N. Kelly, Jr. I was able to overcome many obstacles and sidestep many distractions not because of some special talent that I possess, but because people loved and cared about me enough to invest in me. I have been blessed with amazing mentors who continue to give me a safe space to fail, and a nurturing environment that allows me to stand back up each time I fall.

MENTORS HAVE NOT SCIENTISTS, doctors, physicists, lawyers, or any other high-profile, high-earning individuals. They have been younger men who are still navigating their own path but care enough about me to reach back and give me what I wanted and needed.

This was a means of keeping members informed about the history and workings of the Fraternity. The 78th 12th District Meeting in Anchorage was no exception. Guided by brothers Dow and Darroll Love, 12th District History Chairman, three Grand Basilei, (two previous and the present) in attendance engaged the 12th District Meeting attendees in conversation.

Centered around questions asked by brothers Kwame Dow and Darroll Love (What inspired you to become an Omega and what are standout memories from your intake process that we should sustain? What inspired you to pursue becoming the Grand Basileus? Which prior Grand Basileus influenced you the most during the time you served and why? What advice would you give your brother entering the fraternity 20 years from now?), the discussion was informative and enlightening.

The opportunity to engage these three giants in Omega was not to be missed. Forty-one (41) men (Founder Love served twice) have risen to the ranks of Grand Basileus and to have 3 in one room was nothing short of spectacular. While brothers Dow and Love asked questions of the Grands, the opportunity they afforded the brothers of the 12th was equally as engaging.

Brother Randy Bacon (Beta Mu Mu) asked what Brother Grand Ray saw in him all those years ago to give him an opportunity to serve as a young Omega Man. Or, Brother Melvin Jones (Phi Iota) asking Brother Grand Lewis about the reality of the Grand Basileus role *vs* what he expected and how he had to adjust. With every question Grand Basileus Ray, Knox and Lewis were thoughtful and generous in their response.

For many in the room this was a once in a lifetime event and a moment they will share with Omega Men to come. "I'm sure the story will begin, 'I remember being in Alaska and listening to 42nd Grand Basileus Ricky Lewis, 40th Grand Basileus Antonio Knox and 39th Grand Basileus Andrew Ray share their love for Omega with the Brotherhood," said brother DR Dow.

Just A Thought: "Back to the Good Ole Days"

Those who are hailing this Supreme Court

HE SUPREME COURTS' DECISION to strike down was not determined by the color of a Affirmative Action programs relating to Race Based college admission policies, in my opinion, is just another of land they owned and the number of clear example of bigotry masquerading as fairness.

The recent SCOTUS decision appears part of a devious plot that has many moving parts. Let's put aside for a minute voter suppression, gerrymandering and spurious state legislative laws being put forward, and, the facts that unarmed black men, women and children are being hunted and gunned down by police and citizens who suffer no consequences for their acts. Now add to that list book banning, trumped up anti critical race

theory resistance, color neutral education campaigns in primary and secondary schools, the elimination of diversity, equity and inclusion in post-secondary institutions, no student loan relief, and now no consideration of an applicant's race in college admissions review.

person's skin, but rather by the amount indentured servants who worked for them. Many blacks were considered indentured servants not slaves, and after paying off their debts they would be released from indentured servitude to acquire property and have indentured servants of their own.

That all changed in Virginia when the slave laws were

passed in 1661. Many black folks had their property and assets taken. Then came the Virginia Slave Code in 1705 which defined all slaves as real estate, made slavery permanent condition through the mother, and forbade slaves, free and colored people from physically assaulting white persons. The

enslaved were denied the right to bear arms or move freely without permission.

Those who are hailing this Supreme Court ruling as a victory are using verbiage such as: Back To The Good Ole Days, Affirmative Action Has Run It's Course, and A Color-Blind Society.

Let's start with the **Back To The Good Ole Days** phrase. My father always told me to be wary of those who talk about the Good Ole Days. He used to tell me that the only thing good about the Good Ole Days for Negroes, was that those days were gone!

What about: Affirmative Action Has Run Its Course? What a strange thing to say since laws were passed that made it illegal for blacks to read and/or write. Blacks faced dismemberment of a hand if they were caught writing and the loss of an eye if discovered reading. When the sacrifices of our people, many of those we know and a countless number of those whose names we will never know, were able to achieve school desegregation, de facto segregation remained in place to perpetuate non equal access to education.

Those who claim Affirmative Action is unfair because it discriminates against white people and Asians, must not have a full grasp of history or math, or suffer from selective amnesia. Approximately fifty years of Affirmative Action does not balance out approximately 350 years of exclusion. White folks were not disfigured or murdered for attempting to gain an education. Asians may have been unfairly interred during WW II, but they weren't lynched for seeking knowledge.

A Color-Blind Society was a reality when the colonies were being established around the mid 1600's. Wealth or station

PROPONENTS OF THE DISMANTLING OF AFFIRMATIVE

ACTION operate from the fallacious premise that Affirmative Action is basically white folks giving black folks something they haven't earned, when in reality, they are the ones that have a documented history of taking assets and opportunities they didn't earn. Besides black people, Native Americans can attest to that as well.

A quote that is often misstated is Martin Luther King Jr's, "Judge a man not by the color of his skin, but by the content of his character." I am baffled by many of those that use that phrase to disparage dialogue about Blackness. They put the emphasis on "the color of his skin" portion of the statement whereas I put the emphasis on the content of his character. I would be proud to be judged on my blackness as opposed to being judged on the hypocritical, lying, devious, immoral, and cowardly content of their character.

Athletes are exempt from the ruling. Ironically, they may wind up generating revenue for colleges and universities that refused to accept students like them 50 vears ago.

"With let-them-eat-cake obliviousness, today, the majority pulls the ripcord and announces 'colorblindness for all' by legal fiat. But deeming race irrelevant in law does not make it so in life," wrote Justice Ketanji Brown-Jackson in her dissent. 6/29/2023


dwindling until one year, recently, when it became time to shatter the Piñata, it hung alone; the children had all grown up.

n keeping with the Third District's Fatherhood and Mentoring Program (TDFM), several chapters in Northern Virginia executed community outreach initiatives for youth ages of 8 to 22. The Third District Mentoring Curriculum (TDMC) provides precollege mentoring to youth in focus areas; i.e., STEM, Career/Military Readiness, financial literacy with focus on hard trades such as construction, masonry, HVAC, culinary, and mechanical vocation.

Third District Mentoring Program (TDMP) is composed of 700+ students from 3rd grade to graduating seniors in college. Members of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., (OPPF) ranging from Four-Star United States Military Officers, Program Directors of Cyber Security Companies, Teachers, Principals, Musicians, YouTubers, Game Developers, and entrepreneurial serve as mentors guiding and investing in the next generation of leaders.

Third District Foundation, and TDFM, have been recipients of funding from the Northern Virginia chapter of the Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association (AFCEA-NOVA) since fiscal year 2021 in the amount of \$30,000. AFCEA-NOVA has over 6,000 individual and corporate members: the NOVA chapter boasts the largest membership in the AFCEA International community. They connect members and events to enhance and provide an ethical setting to connect with Government. AFCEA-NOVA hosts several IT Day conferences annually featuring speakers on information technology from the Army, Navy, USMC, Air Force, DOD, and other Federal agencies. For info: 3rddistrictfoundation.org, a 501 (c) 3.

Recent highlights and accomplishments of Third District Mentoring Program (TDMP) with the support of AFCEA-NOVA, shows remarkable and unmatched strides creating pathways from middle school to careers in US Government in areas of STEM. Those accomplishments over the past two years have yielded 2158 hours of mentoring to 1422 students primarily in Fairfax, Prince William, Arlington, Falls Church, and Spotsylvania counties. Fairfax and Prince William Counties school districts caters to approximately 300,000 students within the Northern Virginia community, Fairfax County being the largest school district in Virginia and one of the largest in the United States.

Third District Mentoring Program (TDMP), has created partnerships with state Colleges and Universities including Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA CC), George Mason University, Old Dominion University, Norfolk State University, Hampton University, Virginia Tech, and Virginia State University. These partnerships have yielded over 20 pre-college initiative field trips, 200+ hours of STEM related courses, 45 hours of Financial Literacy, 300+ hours on career and military readiness programs within TDMP.

The support TDMP has received from AFCEA-NOVA has yielded a proof-of-concept prototype by creating pathways for students from middle school to college to careers in STEM supporting the United States Government (USG). This outcome was on full display at the Third District 90th Annual District Conference held in Richmond, Virginia from March 30th to April 2nd 2023.



To experience different things to find out where I best fit in society by using my God given talents to the fullest.

My father has served as an example to me and other young black men that: you write your own narrative and not let society write one for you. My father instilled in me early in my life some core principles that didn't make since to me until 2017 when I became a member of the greatest fraternity in world Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., through Psi Chapter. Those core principles were our four cardinal principles of our beloved fraternity: Manhood, Scholarship, Perseverance, and Uplift.

Those life lessons taught me the power of knowledge and that sometimes we need to educate ourselves before the success process starts in our life. He showed me that education extends beyond the classroom; but when he and I participated in a Father Son Book Club when I was in elementary school, that experience allowed me to see my father's appetite for black literature. The powerful history of our people opened my eyes to the barriers we have overcome and the achievements that followed.

This education gave me the confidence to know that there was nothing in life I could not achieve. What I learned and notice the most was his giving back to the Helping Hands Mentoring Program. Daddy provided uplift in our home and in the community. He took me and other youth in elementary school instilling in them the same love and values

Now as I am taking on manhood myself, I have even more appreciation for my father's love and guidance. As I step back and reflect on my own endeavors and accomplishments it brings me pride to know that I am walking in the light of my father. Working with the Oprah Winfrey Scholars Program in college I was able to give back on a global scale traveling to South Africa and Zimbabwe helping fight many of the Social Justice issues our people share in tandem.

While in Africa, I felt a since of pride reflecting on memories of my father carrying out missionary work in Ghana, West Africa and Port Elizabeth, and South Africa. Even as I think about the family I will start the future, through my father, I know what it takes to be a loving husband and leader. There will be a day where I too will have the opportunity to raise a child and I am forever grateful to have a father that has taught me the invaluable rewards of black fatherhood.



To increase our impact, the District gifted the school with Gift Cards for their use. The school immediately decided to re-gift them to families in need.

Omega-Men powerfully assembled at Osseo High School, which had a room of 60 young men from grades 9 through 12 waiting to hear from us and what we had to share with them. During the introductions of the Omega brothers, we asked the 60 young men how many knew about Omega Psi Phi and what we do. Sadly, we did not have one who knew who we were. This school had a diverse population and African Americans were not the dominant demographic. We were even told by some students that they had not seen such a large group of professionally dressed Black men in suits before. Before getting into the YLC presentation and discussion, we gave them a brief overview of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.

Our topic of focus for the YLC was "Situational Awareness- How to Get the Best Outcome from Any Situation." Our expected take-a-ways we wanted the young men to understand better or further were 1) They control the tone and level of their involvement in any situation. How they respond and react to situations determine (in most cases) how

the other person will respond and react to the situation. 2) Understand the players in any situation & quickly understand what each one needs to get out of the situation. This helps you understand what to say and not to say. 3) Know your role in all situations. Be prepared to Lead, Follow or Support. 4) The Key to Success in all situations is "Your Response" to the situation. The Better you respond, the Better the situation will be for You.

After a great discussion on Situational Awareness and incorporating Decision Making, we opened the floor up for questions. We received tons of questions related to Situational Awareness and Decision Making from the students. However, the most surprising and outstanding question we received from this group of 60 young men who had not heard of Omega Psi Phi before was... "ARE YOU ALL COMING BACK TO SHARE MORE WITH US?"

The local chapter took that as a challenge and immediately began working to establish a mentoring relationship with the school. \square

The Mentorship program helps mentees learn how the judicial system works; the program took mentees (and parents as guests) to Cook County Court for a mock trial. Hosted by the Honorable Judge Brother Steven G. Watkins at the Cook County Judicial Circuit Court in Chicago, mentees, and Brothers designed and produced a mock trial on retail theft.

Weeks before the actual mock trial took place, Brother Keith L. Spence, Esq., reviewed the process of a court trial with the mentees during Omega Y.E.S. sessions. Brother Spence also discussed with mentees the different roles and responsibilities that are in a courtroom, and the different terms with their meanings that are used during a court case. Mentees and Brother Spence practiced a few times before the actual mock trial day. During practice sessions, Brother Spence made it perfectly clear to mentees, "The only ways I want you to ever be in court, are either as the judge, or as a lawyer."

On the day at Cook County Court, mentees were very excited to be appearing before an actual Circuit Court Judge to perform their mock trial. During the mock trial, mentees acted out all other major roles in the court room including the defense lawyer, the prosecutor, sheriffs, and witnesses. Brothers played the roles of the



person accused of retail theft, his accuser, and made up the jury. Parents of the mentees were in the audience watching the mock trial; they were very proud of all their sons' performances.

Brother Christopher Burney, who organized the mock trial stated, "We are very grateful to have the chance to show these young men how to be leaders in our community." Mentees and Brothers produced a dynamic mock trial that was a true learning experience for all.

At the end of the session, the Honorable Judge Brother Watkins said in his courtroom, "I am very, very proud of these young men who came to demonstrate their leadership abilities. They are our next generation of leadership. We as parents, family members, and Brothers must do whatever it takes to mentor and develop these young men to their full potential. I never want to see any of these youth in my courtroom for the absolute wrong reasons, unfortunately like I see so many others in my court."

At the end of the day, the mentees had a great day learning the judicial system in Cook County Judicial Circuit Court in Chicago, Illinois. The Rho Gamma Gamma Omega Y.E.S. DURING THE FOUNDER'S BANQUET, Brother Abraham J. Turner, Major General USA, (Retired) gave a rousing keynote speech to a packed banquet room in Anchorage. The General focused on three themes: First, the founder's intent, explanation, and rationale for setting

> Second, he charged the Fraternity to go out and make a difference - "in our own neighborhoods, schools, and governmental entities." He spot-lighted the shootings in Nashville and the bravery displayed by state legislators Justin Jones, Justin Pearson, and Glory Johnson, all legislators in Tennessee. "Who needs an AR-15, it's a killing machine," he said.

Third, the General challenged older brothers to escalate efforts to mentor younger brothers. He charged brothers to "work with Generation Zers [the most diverse generation of Americans to date in a variety of demographics]; engage them in voter registration and continue to get out the vote (GOTV). The deck is stacked against us," he said.

IN CONCLUSION, GENERAL TURNER told the brotherhood to be more observant. "Notice what our politicians are doing that restrict voting, misleading robocalls, gerrymandering safe and favorable districts that often leaves out our voices and votes." He cautioned some to, "not feel to safe sitting out in the very blue state of California." All must make sure, he said, "we elect people who will vote your way."

Following his speech, Brother Nate Rivers, Gamma Alpha Alpha host chapter, presented the General with a gift that was "unique to Alaska."

Bahamas Beautillion Gentlemen's Club and Omega Psi Phi Together Building Stout-hearted Men

Nassau, Bahamas – The Bahamas Beautillion committee is composed of volunteers led by Brother Lamon Stubbs of Pi Xi Chapter located in Nassau. The Organization was founded by The Late Dr. Judson and Mrs. Marcheta Eneas. Over the past 20 plus years, the committee has mentored over 1,500 young men, taking them through a process of manhood training.

The program begins in the fall of each year when applications are distributed to all the high schools in Nassau, Bahamas. Applications require twelfth grade students to submit an autobiographical essay, a list of their honors and community activities, two recommendations from a counselor, and a member of the community, in addition to a copy of their official transcript. The applications are then screened by an independent selection committee, and afterwards, the names are submitted to the Beautillion Committee for acceptance.

The Beautillion is a rite of passage for young men from a diverse set of social and economic backgrounds. We insure that for twelve to fourteen weeks; the young men are exposed to a variety of guest speakers from the community. They receive instruction on the Bahamian constitution and their role in the global community. Specialized training is also provided in the areas of conflict management and deportment. In order to produce men of character, attendance to social events such as art exhibits, plays and musical concerts is required.

In addition to the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., the Bahamas Beautillion has partnered with other organizations such as Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity, Nassau Chapter of Links, Toastmasters Club 1600, and Price Waterhouse Cooper. These organizations donate their time and scholarships year after year. At the end of the season, the young men are presented to the community, family, and friends at the Annual Ball in white tie attire as finished men of poise and character. Each year scholarships averaging approximately \$100,000 are awarded to the young men. These funds can be used to offset tuition and living expenses. In the past, several college-bound high school seniors received scholarships to Morehouse College, St. John's University, and Fisk University.
